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### Preface

The glamorous days of unlimited barrage construction are definitely gone. Initiated by the industrial countries but nowadays spread world-wide, dam builders are increasingly facing opposition from many sources. The bandwidth extends from the well-meaning selfless environmentalist who tries to protect a certain region, to the powerful international organisations which support their goals with such ideology. The supporters have watched this situation in silence for too long, assuming that the constructions and the resulting benefits would speak for themselves. The ensuing confrontation easily ends up in complete deadlock, which benefits no-one.

As a promoter and agent of dam construction, ICOLD can no longer ignore the situation and must face up to it – which it is doing. This cannot, however, merely be limited to the presentation of the advantages but must also include knowledge and examination of the objections. We know insufficient about the counter-arguments, especially when they are of a non-technical nature.

The presentation of the final report of the World Commission on Dams (WCD) in November 2000 was an excellent opportunity to let representatives of the anti-dam movement speak in a symposium in order to help others understand their position and discuss it in an open, factual and objective manner. Both sides can learn from each other and thus master this difficult situation.

In three sessions, the WCD's point of view and the pros and cons of dam construction will be presented by invited speakers and then discussed. It is the first time since the publication of WCD's final report to discuss the report with an open and international audience. That is why we highly esteem these contributions from the floor.

Therefore this volume contains only the invited lectures in order to assist the audience and to stimulate a vital discussion. After the Annual Meeting a comprehensive and well-shaped volume will be published as proceedings of the symposium, including the final lectures and all the questions and answers. It is our strong intention that this proceedings may serve in the future as state-of-the-art for the integration of dams into water resources management and natural and social environment.

The organizing committee deeply acknowledges the invited lectureres for their kind assistance and contribution to this unique symposium.
